## Countable and uncountable 1

| Countable | Uncountable |
| :---: | :---: |
| I eat a banana every day. | I eat rice every day. |
| I like bananas. | I like rice. |
| Banana is a countable noun. | Rice is an uncountable noun. |
| A countable noun can be singular (banana) or plural (bananas). | An uncountable noun has only one form (rice). There is no plural. |
| We can use numbers with countable nouns. | We cannot use numbers with uncountable nouns. |
| So we can say one banana, two bananas etc. | We cannot say 'one rice', 'two rices' etc. |
| Examples of nouns usually countable: | Examples of nouns usually uncountable: |
| Kate was singing a song. | Kate was listening to music. |
| There's a nice beach near here. | There's sand in my shoes. |
| Do you have a ten-pound note? | Do you have any money? |
| It wasn't your fault. It was an accident. There are no batteries in the radio. We don't have enough cups. | It wasn't your fault. It was bad luck. There is no electricity in this house. We don't have enough water. |


| You can use a/an with singular countable <br> nouns: | We do not use a/an with uncountable <br> nouns. |
| :--- | :--- |
| a beach a student an umbrella <br> You cannot use singular countable nouns <br> alone (without a/the/my etc.): | We do not say 'a sand', 'a music', 'a rice'. <br> But you can often use a ... of. For <br> example: |
| Do you want a banana? <br> (not want banana) | a bowl / a packet / a grain of rice <br> You can use uncountable nouns alone <br> (without the/my/some etc.): |
| There's been an accident. <br> (not There's been accident) | I eat rice every day. <br> There's blood on your shirt. <br> You can use plural countable nouns alone: |
| Can you hear music? |  |
| I like bananas. (= bananas in general) |  |


| You can use some and any with plural <br> countable nouns: | You can use some and any with <br> uncountable nouns: |
| :--- | :--- |
| We sang some songs. |  |
| Did you buy any apples? | We listened to some music. <br> Did you buy any apple juice? |
| We use many and few with plural <br> countable nouns: | We use much and little with uncountable <br> nouns: |
| We didn't take many pictures. <br> I have a few things to do. | We didn't do much shopping. <br> I have a little work to do. |
