Regional, and Social." These additions reflect a shift toward contextualizing grammar within real-world communication, acknowledging regional and social variations in English usage. Additionally, two appendices—"A Basic Introduction to Tree Diagramming" and "An Introduction to Transformational Grammar"—were added to provide students with tools to analyze sentence structures and understand generative grammar principles. These stages of revision demonstrate Stageberg's and Oaks' commitment to keeping the text relevant for modern learners.
