- **Adjectives** and **adverbs** are discussed as modifiers, with adjectives describing nouns (e.g., "blue sky") and adverbs modifying verbs, adjectives, or other adverbs (e.g., "quickly ran").
- **Pronouns** are explained as substitutes for nouns (e.g., "he," "which"), covering types like personal, relative, and indefinite pronouns.
- **Prepositions** and **conjunctions** are introduced as connectors, with prepositions linking nouns to other words (e.g., "in the house") and conjunctions joining clauses or words (e.g., "and," "because").
- **Interjections** are noted as exclamatory words expressing emotion (e.g., "wow").

The chapter also addresses **form classes** (nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs) versus **function words** (prepositions, conjunctions, pronouns, auxiliaries),

highlighting how form classes carry lexical meaning while function words primarily serve grammatical purposes. Stageberg further explores **inflectional paradigms**, showing how words change form to indicate grammatical categories like number (e.g., "cat" vs. "cats"), tense (e.g., "walk" vs. "walked"), or degree (e.g., "big" vs. "bigger"). The concept of **word formation** is revisited, linking back to morphemes by discussing processes like derivation (e.g., "kindness" from "kind") and compounding (e.g., "notebook").

Pedagogical Approach

Chapter Nine is designed to be both theoretical and practical, aligning with Stageberg's goal of making linguistic concepts accessible to advanced students. The chapter includes structured exercises that encourage students to identify and classify words within sentences, analyze their grammatical functions, and explore how inflectional changes affect meaning. For example, students might be asked to categorize words in a sentence like "The quick fox fled from danger" into their respective parts of speech or to identify inflectional forms of a verb like "sing" (e.g., "sang," "sung," "singing"). These exercises reinforce the chapter's concepts and help students apply word classification to real-world language use.

The chapter's clear explanations and abundant examples, drawn from everyday English, ensure accessibility for both native and non-native speakers. Its structured approach, combined with practical applications, makes it an effective tool for classroom instruction and self-study, particularly for non-native learners in regions like Vietnam, where the textbook is widely adopted.

The primary objective of Chapter Nine is to provide students with a thorough understanding of word classification and their grammatical roles in English. By categorizing words into parts of speech and distinguishing between form classes and function words, the chapter aims to equip students with the skills to analyze sentence structure and word function. It seeks to deepen students' knowledge of how words are formed and modified, building on the morphemic analysis from Chapter Eight to show how morphemes combine into words with specific syntactic purposes.
