- Infinitives:

- I use my cell Phone **to send** messages.
- Some people use their phones **to watch** videos.
- People often use their phones **to take** photos.

- Gerunds:

- I use my cell phone **for sending** messages.
- Some people use their phones **for watching** videos.
- People often use their phones **for taking** photos.
